We are pleased to announce the consolidation of our four Lake Minnetonka Historical Societies has won overwhelming approval from the membership of each of the societies. The consolidation will become effective on October 1, 2023. All four historical societies will dissolve and the newly formed LMHS will carry forward their shared mission of telling the story of Lake Minnetonka by collecting, preserving and sharing its history.

The four organizations have collaborated successfully in the past and share similar missions, collection areas, members, funders, volunteers, and audiences. Each of the organizations is in good fiscal health, but all face similar challenges including attracting and sustaining volunteer leadership. In 2019 the organizations received a \$52,000 Heritage Partnership Grant funded by an appropriation to the Minnesota Historical Society from the Minnesota Arts & Cultural Heritage Fund. This enabled a Joint Committee established by the four organizations to hire Arts Consulting Group to analyze all aspects of each organization (i.e., missions, programs, and constituents) and to study various models across the strategic alliance spectrum. It was determined that consolidation into one organization would best address their challenges and allow them to better serve the history of the Lake Minnetonka community.

The LMHS will have one of the largest archival and three-dimensional collections of Lake Minnetonka history available inperson and online. Working together to combine the strengths of each organization, and with the eventual addition of professional staff, the new organization plans to expand their mission and tell the story of Lake Minnetonka in updated and innovative ways for all audiences. The new organization will collect, preserve and share Lake Minnetonka history in the communities of Deephaven, Excelsior, Greenwood, Minnetonka, Minnetonka Beach, Minnetrista, Mound, Orono, Shorewood, Spring Park, Tonka Bay, Victoria, Wayzata & Woodland.

Future plans for LMHS include housing their consolidated archives in one location to allow for best preservation practices and convenient public access; sharing the lake's history through expanded public programs and experiences around the lake as well as in their current museums in Excelsior, Mound & Wayzata; and returning *Minnehaha* to active operation on Lake Minnetonka.

The new LMHS will be governed by a Board of Directors consisting of two directors designated by each organization. MLM's directors are Sharon Provost and Tom McCarthy. Aaron Person will serve as a director on behalf of the Wayzata Historical Society. Current MLM directors Liz Vandam and Scott McGinnis will also serve as LMHS directors representing Westonka Historical Society and the Excelsior-Lake Minnetonka Historical Society respectively. *Minnehaha* will be well represented!

Work on forming the new LMHS is already proceeding full speed ahead. Tom McCarthy will continue to lead the search for a new launch solution. Stay tuned for future updates on the transition and how you can get involved!



Update from the Barn

MLM continues to be blessed with the best crew of dedicated maintenance engineers and volunteers! Currently, the team is prepping the installation of the new high water alarm system by stringing marine-grade wiring that is compliant with the latest ABYC industry standards.

Hull Rehabilitation Grant

Thanks to the advice of long-time *Minnehaha* friend and master shipwright Mark Sauer, the Board decided to move forward with removing the bottom paint from the hull. Mark felt strongly that doing so could help inform our pending large grant application for funding from the Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage Grant Program. We were already working on a large grant application to address the five cracked ribs and two stern planks – all of which need replacing. Mark knows full well that work to rehabilitate a vessel's hull often reveals unanticipated surprises once a project is underway. Because MNHS only considers large grant requests (over \$10,000) once each year, it was critical that our request minimize the risk of encountering surprise issues. Removing the bottom paint would inform us about any other structural work that should be incorporated into our funding request.

Mark could not have been more spot on. As the paint was being removed, it became evident that the bottom planks at the stern had significant rot issues. Fortunately, the rot is mostly limited to four bottom planks – two on port, two on starboard. Why the rot was concentrated on these planks is unknown. As Mark observed upon inspecting the boat "...it could've been worse." However, the impact on the hull's structural integrity is such that repairs must be made before she can return to operation. Fortunately, we found out now while she is still laid up.

The Board has now submitted a comprehensive application which fully documents the extent of the repairs needed and outlines the necessary work phases. In total, the funding request totals \$102,369 which covers replacement of the ribs, stern and bottom planks, plus recaulking and repainting so the hull is structurally sound and watertight. Fortunately, *Minnehaha's* addition to the National Register of Historic Places now enables MLM to apply for preservation funding. A decision is anticipated by the end of the year at which time MLM will open a Request For Proposals from qualified shipwrights for this project.

Thanks to Liz Vandam, Paul Maravelas, and Rachel Houck for their expertise in helping craft our application. Fingers crossed!

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New Hall of Fame Inductees!

The Board is pleased to announce the induction of five new members to *Minnehaha's* Hall of Fame:

- John Moorhead is being recognized posthumously for his service as naval architect for the restored Minnehaha and his work to procure and ship the O'Connor steam engine.
- Lori Hammond is being recognized for her involvement in many aspects of the Minnehaha Restoration Project beginning around 1993. Lori also helped lead the initial captain's training program in 1995-96.
- Ann Merriman and Chris Olson were instrumental in virtually all administrative activities during the late 1990s and early 2000s, including staffing the Steamboat Division office. Both played a significant role in the formation of the Museum of Lake Minnetonka in 2003-4. Ann & Chris formed Maritime Heritage Minnesota circa 2010 and now are among Minnesota's leading underwater archeologists.
- Bruce Tuttle is being recognized for his involvement in multiple aspects of the Minnehaha Restoration Project beginning around 1994. Bruce became one of Minnehaha's early captains in the late 1990s and served most seasons until 2016.

Because of the pending consolidation creating the new Lake Minnetonka Historical Society, MLM will not be hosting a social gathering of the membership before its dissolution. We encourage all to reach out and welcome these new inductees!

The Board is also creating a Hall of Fame plaque where the names of all *Minnehaha* Hall of Fame inductees will be permanently enshrined. This long overdue tribute will be unveiled soon!

Two plaques designating *Minnehaha's* listing on the NRHP are on order and will be proudly on display as passengers enter through the gangway.





WAYZATA MOVES FORWARD WITH NEW LAKEWALK & DOCKS!

After a lengthy design project, Wayzata has now begun construction of a new lakewalk that will run from the Depot to the Broadway Avenue docks and connect to the Section Foreman house. While the wooden docks at the Depot will remain, the City is constructing new transient docks at both the Depot and at Broadway Avenue. Tom McCarthy of MLM participated as a member of the Dock Planning Task Force. Be sure to stop by and check out all the construction activity now underway at the waterfront!
